
# **Updates from the field**

### It Takes a Heart to Save a Heart

Surgeons of Hope continues to support the work of the skilled medical team in Paraguay focusing on building capacity within the public health sector. Through close collaboration there is sustainable progress. Since 2019, over 600 children with heart problems have been helped.

Progress in Paraguay and in other countries is exactly what Surgeons of Hope seeks to bring to Latin America, so that children afflicted with heart conditions that they are born with or acquire in their early years can receive first-world treatment for those conditions without needing to travel great distances to other countries to receive treatment. The benefit is obvious for the children and their families.

Reports from the Paraguay team indicate a higher volume of less-invasive, but effective, catheterization procedures, as well as open-heart surgeries with no complications. These reports from April and May are gratifying to the local medical team and to the team leaders at Surgeons of Hope. 
#### Meet our Heart Heroes

Lizzeth, at 9 years of age, was suffering from arterial aneurysms and had undergone various corrective procedures. Results of a follow-up catheterization in early April showed the good news that the arteries were now functioning normally with proper diameters. Our support of a well-supplied and maintained catheterization department at the hospital has been essential.

Surgeons of Hope has supplied equipment and training to the local team during past missions. We celebrate along with Lizzeth and her family.

Little Evelyn, at 3 years of age, was suffering from a heart valve problem that had been limiting her life since birth. In late May, Evelyn underwent a therapeutic catheterization using a balloon catheter. The procedure was accomplished without complication and she is happily at home now.

Thanks to her local medical team, she was cared for close to home in her local hospital, where Surgeons of Hope has supported needed upgrades.





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#### Training activities



Paraguay has been invited to be part of the International Quality Improvement Collaborative (IQIC) for Congenital Heart Disease (CHD). This program was launched in 2008 to provide benchmarking data for congenital heart surgery in the developing world with the overall goal of guiding quality improvement efforts and reducing mortality for CHD. Assembling data from over 70 sites in more than 25 different countries, the principal goals are to 1) create tailored quality improvement strategies to reduce mortality and major complications in emerging programs and 2) employ a telemedicine platform to facilitate distance learning, dialogue, and to disseminate knowledge and skills.

Surgeons of Hope is collaborating with the team at **The Hospital General Universitario Gregorio Marañón** in Madrid to invite and accommodate nurses from the **Hospital General Pediatrico Acosta Ñu in Paraguay for training. Nurses will be trained in cardiac hemodynamics, perfusion and critical care for children with congenital heart defects**
